2 Samuel 13

How do we become people who do something about injustice?

9 Observations:

1. Injustice begins with self-centeredness. (v 2)
2. Injustice grows when we keep the wrong company. (v 3-5)
3. Injustice grows when we fail to exercise discernment. (v 6-7)
4. Injustice grows when victims are the only ones speaking the truth. (v 12-13)
5. Injustice grows because we believe the wrong things about power. (v 14)
6. Injustice creates unreasonable hatred in the one who performs it. (v 15 - 17)
7. Injustice steals some valuable aspect of a person's image bearing nature. (v 18-19)
8. Injustice requires more than feeling bad. (v 21)
9. Failure to deal with injustice leads to more injustice. (v 21 - 29)

3. What is your natural reaction to discussing injustice? Why do you think this is the case?

5. When you think about injustice in our cultural context, what issues do you think of and why? How can you engage this broader cultural issue of injustice practically?
6. How does it help to know that God has, is, and will do something about all injustice....when you're a victim? When you're the perpetrator? When you're a witness?



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
